

Dr. Arnold is currently an Associate Professor in Emergency Medicine at the Drexel University School of Medicine. He has a Masters degree in Medical Science from the Boston University School of Medicine and his Medical Doctorate from Loma Linda University School of Medicine in Loma Linda, California. Following his residency in Emergency Medicine Cooper University Hospital, Dr. Arnold completed a Fellowship in Shock Research at Cooper University Hospital focused on the design and execution of emergency medicine and critical care-based clinical trials. 
